#### Overview:

In the early 1900s, jazz was not considered an acceptable form of serious music. Fortunately, George Gershwin changed that concept by composing jazz that could not be ignored. Through his creative genius and dedication to American music, Gershwin created some of the most popular music of all time. George Gershwin was a delightful, sensitive man who, in his short lifetime, created such masterpieces as *Rhapsody in Blue, An American in Paris*, and *Porgy and Bess*.
